The new Melbourne's Men's Shed was proud to celebrate the completion of its first community project when it hands over 30 handmade toys to the Royal Children's Hospital on 27 August 2014. The toys, designed by RMIT student Jessica Mew, were created from old shipping crates and pallets. The project provided an opportunity for the Men's Shed participants to learn new up-cycling skills and be resourceful with simple hand tools in a team environment. Frank Coppens, Vice Chairman of the Shed said the team has been working hard and is thrilled to be making such a meaningful contribution to the hospital. "Becoming involved in a range of new activities, events and initiatives and meeting a diverse group of new mates undoubtedly improves our health and emotional well-being," he said. The group provides a supportive and respectful environment that enables anyone with an interest in coming together in the Shed environment to participate," he said. Being involved in the toy project has been a rewarding experience for Lachlan Jones, a former Paralympian who owns his own business selling the *Big Issue*. He has been a regular participant at the Shed since seeking help to have his trailer fixed.
